# ***“Building Our Future by Preserving Our Past”***

The Town of Trappe is a small village, traditionally of 300-400 residents, but the surrounding area has always been “Trappe” as well. To be from “Trappe” means you are from the lower third of Talbot County. This small town has always been a crossroads in the south of the county, not exactly waterfront but many acres of tillable land. While the town itself is not waterfront, the rest of Trappe is surrounded on three sides by the Choptank River and Island Creek. Trappe has been a farm rich area for growing tobacco, tomatoes, corn, soybeans, wheat and other seasonal vegetables. Farms along the river have aided in the selling and shipping of these crops. Trappe has produced/been home to several notable folks: Franklin “Home Run” Baker, John Dickenson, Robert Mitchum, Brigadier General John S.D. Eisenhower, Uncle “Nace” Hopkins, Samuel Stevens, and Daniel Martin.

On April 9, 2006, twenty-seven residents of Trappe gathered to explore the idea of

Fox Hall, Inc. donated the land and house that now make up the Museum grounds. The other buildings were donated by the Slaughter and Adams families from the outlying area as the opportunity arose.

Our mission statement: “To preserve, share, and celebrate the rich heritage of Trappe, Maryland.” is something we take to heart. We celebrate the accomplishments of remarkable individuals such as “Nace” Hopkins, a former slave who served in the Union Army and went on to help establish a school for African American children, helped found Scotts Church and began the Emancipation Day Celebration in 1867 that continues to this day. We also honor Franklin “Home Run” Baker, a hero of baseball’s dead-ball era who earned a place in the Hall of Fame; two of Maryland’s Governors and the many “ordinary” citizens whose everyday contributions make our community extraordinary.

Our progress has been inspiring, but our continued success relies on the support of our community to be members, directors, volunteers, and friends like you. Everyone has a role to play!



## **The Old Trappe High School Clock**


